Comments from the Executive Director - Wendy Blom



As I near the end of my 25 year career in public access TV, I feel fortunate to have witnessed the remarkable evolution of the field. In 1995 we shot video with heavy Umatic 3/4"

video cassette camcorders and did tape to tape analog editing. Programs were loaded by hand into decks for cablecast several times each day. Public access was first come, first served, member-produced programs and staff were facilitators, not producers. Free speech was the core mission and function. LTC's regular orientation sessions drew dozens of new members, as TV was the most valued mass medium and residents were eager to gain access to the channels to communicate with their neighbors.

Since then, technology evolved faster and faster and public access also evolved to meet the challenge of staying relevant and useful. At LTC it meant that staff became more involved with producing programs that served the particular needs of Lowell's diverse residents and nonprofits. Live City meeting coverage grew to an average of six meetings each week and we began streaming online as well. The pandemic has pushed us even further into Internet-based production techniques, with some producers going live from home and others uploading their shows to cloudbased servers. We could not have imagined these things back in 1995. However, the most important things have not changed a bit, including members communicating with their neighbors in Khmer, Portuguese, Spanish, and English, and the City government relying on LTC for transparency. I am confident that these things will continue long after I am gone.

I am so appreciative of the talented staff members I have worked with at LTC who

shared my vision of LTC service. And I appreciate the dedicated Board members who saw a bright future for the organization and welcomed changes to the Board structure that facilitated its work. I have met so many wonderful people in Lowell: member producers who taught me about their distinctive cultures, nonprofit leaders, students, interns, artists, professors, and elected officials at all levels. I will certainly look back with fondness and will sorely miss producing programs and being involved with Lowell and LTC. I wish the organization all the best as it enters a new chapter of leadership.

LTC Adapts to the Pandemic

In March 2020 when the COVID 19 pandemic hit Massachusetts, Governor Baker issued directives to close down public spaces, offices, schools, and events. LTC quickly complied and adapted the work to continue remotely.

The City meetings immediately transitioned to Zoom and LTC was able to direct the live Zoom sessions through the Studio B switcher to Channel 99 and the Web. LTC Producers were encouraged to videotape at home and send in their shows via the LTC video server and Dropbox. Some used zoom, others

used cellphones and video cameras to continue producing their important programs for their neighbors. Staff worked from home to keep the channels on the air, community needs met, and the bills paid.

Virtual events put on by community organizations and elected officials were broadcast live to keep residents informed about available services, food distribution, and health issues. Socially distanced festivals and rallies were videotaped for air, including the Puerto Rican Flag Raising.

LTC collaborated with groups seeking social justice and a healthy planet. Black Lives Matter rally

In the Spring, the COVID 19 pandemic exposed racial disparities in health, and the murder of George Floyd pushed Black Lives Matters supporters to advocate for changes in policing in Lowell. On June 24, LTC went live from the Lowell Senior Center where residents and

community leaders spoke from the heart to elected officials about their experiences of racism. LTC also covered Lowell's Juneteenth event, BLM rallies, and allegations of racism in nonprofit leadership. On July 14, LTC videotaped the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Consortium rally in the JFK Plaza to to urge the Lowell City Council to declare that racism is a public health crisis.

LTC was an active member of Lowell Votes, an organization that provides nonpartisan election information to residents. LTC partnered with Working Cities Lowell on increasing civic engagement in the Acre neighborhood, and collaborated with LLAMA, a mutual aid group that helps Lowell residents get the resources they need during the pandemic.

Comments from the Municipal Director - Kris Macneil

Channel 99 entered 2020 like any other year, but things radically changed on March 15, 2020 when the State was partially shut down due to the outbreak of COVID-19. However frightening a reality that presented, the wheels of local government must still move - and did move. Government transparency and the accessibility of information are inherently important tenets, but in the face of this pandemic, they've become even more critical. People were looking for information, updates, answers, and hope. Channel 99 helped connect residents with information while they were unable to attend meetings in person.

While the School Committee started on Zoom in March, City Council and other committees chose to go audio-only. We conducted the meetings for some time this way, changing images on the screen to show who was talking when. Eventually the City Council and other committees moved to Zoom. The School Committee also became the first to go back into the Council Chambers in the Summer. We adapted the technology to allow for hybrid meetings, where some participants were in the Chamber, and others joined virtually. City Council made its way back into the Chambers in the Fall, utilizing the hybrid system to allow the public to join in from home. We continue to adapt to these unprecedented conditions as the pandemic creates serious health concerns. The show must go on!

Lowell City of Learning

LTC, in partnership with the City of Lowell and a variety of organizations in Lowell, celebrated the first Virtual Lowell City of Learning Festival from September 29 to October 2, 2020. From dance moves to science discovery to building a small business, the Lowell City of Learning Festival offered a free collection of documentaries, discussions, and virtual events to the public on LTC Channel 8 and on-line.

LTC staffers Soumita Acharya and Sabrina Pedersen were integral partners in planning the event, producing three videos, packaging multiple programs for air, and doing social media marketing.

In unison with the Cork Learning City in Ireland and other United Nations UNESCO-designated cities across the globe, Lowell celebrated this week-long festival in the hopes of becoming the first UNESCO Learning City in the United States.

City Council Candidate Debate

LTC was the place to go for local 2019 election information. LTC recorded two-minute speeches by the primary election candidates for City Council and School Committee. The speeches were compiled into two programs that were cablecast on Channel 8, and the individual speeches were uploaded to YouTube. In addition, LTC hosted five debates live in the studio in collaboration with the *Lowell Sun*, *Khmer Post USA*, and the CMAA. On election day, LTC set up a remote studio at the Blue Shamrock on Market Street to cover the results live with local political pundits on Channels 8 and 99 and streamed on Facebook.

In advance of the 2020 elections, U.S. Presidential Primary Candidates Joe Sestak (D) and Gov. Bill Weld (R) came to Lowell High School and gave one-on-one interviews for LTC. LTC hosted candidate interviews and a debate for the primary election for State Representative.

NewEARS Prog Show

LTC Member Alan Baillargeon began recording his NewEARS Progresive Rock podcast in 2014 with the goal of creating a community of music enthusiasts dedicated to sharing and promoting progressive rock in New

England. When he heard about LTC's new podcast studio in late 2018, he jumped at the opportunity to use the new equipment and comfortable space. Since then, Alan and his crew have come in to the LTC Podcast Studio every week to record interviews with musicians around the world via Skype and Zoom. Besides talking about music and playing music, he also provides information for his listeners about local show cancellations, how to get refunds, and rescheduled performances due to the pandemic.

Lowell Counts for the Census

LTC helped to make Lowell one the the most successful cities in the Northeast Region of the United States for Census participation. As a member of the Lowell Counts Committee that included staff of many community service and religious organizations, LTC created social media and channel outreach campaigns in multiple languages to promote the Census as safe, easy, and important. LTC recorded 13 PSA's in 8 languages with community leaders.
